Minutes - Business Meeting - April 3, 2009

President Maria Febbo called the meeting to order at 4:17 p.m. The members thanked her for providing beignets.

Vice President Idee Winfield put this year's program together. She thanked the membership for their involvement and sent a pad around for ideas for panel and paper sessions and workshops for next year's program.

Secretary Susan Ambler presented the minutes for the 4-10-08 Business Meeting. The minutes were approved as presented.

Membership Report and Treasurer's Report: Treasurer and Membership Chair Shannon Davis presented her reports. She stated that the formal membership report will be e-mailed. She said that we have experienced a drop in membership which may be due to graduate students joining for one year and then not renewing. Shannon reminded us that last year a suggestion was that a senior member should buy a junior member a drink. Also, we decided not to organize informal lunches because so much was happening at this year's (2009) meeting. We will reinstitute drinks again at the 2010 meeting. Regarding communication with membership, Perry Threlfall has redesigned the website. We also talked about placing the story of our quilt online.

Next, Shannon presented the Treasurer's Report. She indicated that there was \$689.74 in the account. Shannon stated we have paid \$112.55 to Julie Wiest for representing us at the SWS Winter Meeting, but we will get SWS national to pay as much of this as possible. Shannon brought up the issue of creating an online Paypal type of arrangement, but she pointed out that the cost may counteract the benefit. Next, Shannon stated that SWS-S has donated funds to Kate Slevin's reception in memory of Carla Howery. Idee Winfield moved that we also donate \$300 to the ASA Teaching Enhancement Fund. The motion was seconded. The motion carried. Shannon then stated that individuals should renew their memberships for \$15 for faculty and \$5 for students for 2009-10.

Archivist Diane Everett reported that she has the archives in her office.

National Liaison's Report: Julie Wiest presented her report. A contentious discussion and vote high-

lighted the business meetings. Motivated by a previous election issue, a change to the bylaws was proposed: "In the event of a tie, there will be a runoff vote right away for the tied position." After much debate, mostly about possible alternatives to a runoff, the motion passed with two-thirds of the vote (36 to 24) and with the inclusion of a time element: "In the event of a tie, there will be a runoff vote within 30 days for the tied position." Julie reported that Mary Zimmerman was the keynote speaker discussing SWS's initiative on universal health care. Constance Curry, a civil rights activist and author, gave a luncheon presentation entitled "We Who Believe in Freedom." She also stated that a panel of Gender & Society founders (Chris Bose, Cynthia Fuchs Epstein, Mary Frank Fox, Judith Lorber, Patricia Martin, and Mary Zimmerman) was inspiring and very well done. Also, Julie reported that a media workshop was given to provide tips on how sociologists can work better with the media. Julie indicated that she attended the Membership Committee meeting. They are working on a database which will be able to track who is renewing and who is not. Last year SWS had 986 members. Julie reported that for the first time every graduate student attending the meeting received a Hand match. There was discussion of making this a standard process.

Discussion

What to do about formal and informal mentoring - Susan Hinze pointed out that the ASA Hand Program is effective. April Brayfield asked how do we know who needs mentoring? Idee suggested that we could mail fliers and membership brochures to graduate programs in the South. It would also be possible to use the SSS list serv. April said we should remind graduate students and each other to send abstracts for the program as part of our mentoring. Then we could continue to mentor these individuals as they become faculty members. Rachel Ivie suggested we call it a Southern Hand.

What to do about online membership and payment - Idee suggested that online payment would cost approximately \$.45-.50. She suggested we try it for a couple of years and see what the costs are as well as

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the number of members generated. We could add \$1 to dues to pay for the costs. Shannon said she will look into it and make it happen. Idee made a motion to have a two-year trial period using an online payment of dues. At the end of the period we will reassess and make any cost adjustment necessary to the dues. The motion was seconded. Discussion followed. Shannon said she thinks it will increase membership, and whoever takes over the job may not be located where the bank is in North Carolina. This method to deposit would allow access to funds more quickly. The motion carried.

What to do about the Newsletter Editor's term length - Maria pointed out that she has been working an extra year as Newsletter Editor, which means her term ended up being three years rather than two years. What this would mean for the next editor is that she would need to serve either one year or three years in order to get back on track. Maria pointed out that this time the newsletter was linked to her own website instead of sending the newsletter to Cathy Zimmer to put on the SWS-S website. Idee raised the question of

whether we really need two online and one printed newsletter. The consensus was that we publish twice a year, once prior to the annual meeting and also in the fall in the newsletter and on the webpage. We do not need to print and mail anymore. This is a bylaws issue that will need to be presented next year. Julie volunteered to serve for three years in order to get the office back in the order of service.

Election of officers:

- Vice President - Idee Winfield was nominated for Vice President.
- SWS Liaison - Carmel Price and Tanetta Andersson were nominated as SWS Liaison and to attend the SWS Winter Meeting in Santa Barbara.
- Secretary - Patricia Drentea was nominated for Secretary.

The members present elected all of those nominated to the above positions.

President Maria Febbo-Hunt declared the meeting adjourned at 5:08 p.m.

Proposed Bylaws Change

As a reminder, the Sociologist for Women in Society in the South Constitution and By Laws provides for amending said document in the following manner:

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

Section 1. Any member may propose amendments to the SWS-S Constitution.

Section 2. Proposed amendments shall be sent to the President and to the Newsletter Editor. Proposed amendments shall appear in the SWS-S newsletter prior to the annual meeting and shall be voted on at the annual meeting.

Section 3. A simple majority of voting members present at the SWS-S annual meeting shall be necessary to amend the Constitution.

Per the discussion of the members present at the 2009 business meeting, I am proposing the following changes to the constitution and by laws:

CURRENT:

Sociologists for Women in Society in the South Constitution and By Laws

ARTICLE IV. STRUCTURE

Section 4. Duties and Powers

E. Newsletter Editor

1. To edit and publish at least **three** issues of the newsletter per year.
2. To maintain liaison with officers and chairpersons of all committees for news.
3. To maintain liaison with similar organizations having their own newsletters by exchanging newsletters and reprinting useful information as it seems feasible.

PROPOSED CHANGE:

ARTICLE IV. STRUCTURE

Section 4. Duties and Powers

E. Newsletter Editor

1. To edit and publish at least **two online** issues of the newsletter per year.
2. To maintain liaison with officers and chairpersons of all committees for news.
3. To maintain liaison with similar organizations having their own newsletters by exchanging newsletters and reprinting useful information as it seems feasible.



SWS Winter Meeting Reports

Escaping Cleveland during a particularly deep freeze for Santa Barbara, CA, to attend the SWS Winter meetings was a welcome break for this dissertating graduate student! This year's theme, Left Coast Feminisms: Reimagining Borders, Bodies, and the Law, was well reflected in the keynote thematic lecture by Pierrette Hondagneu-Sotelo, Professor and Director of Graduate Studies at the University of Southern California entitled, "From Crossing Borders to Challenging Borders: Bridging the Research and Politics of Gender Migration." While immigration and transnational studies have blossomed in recent years, these fields have seemed oblivious to incorporating gender analyses. However, Prof. Hondagneu-Sotelo explained that gender is deeply implicated in the context of immigration, and she highlighted gender scholarship in five areas or streams, including gender and migration, carework, sexualities, sex trafficking, and borderlands. Next, focusing on intersections with citizenship, race, and gender, Prof. Hondagneu-Sotelo reviewed increasingly restrictive immigration policies trends since the 1960s. Laws similar to Proposition 187 (which indicates our acceptance of individual workers but not as members of families in need of public services), new waves of Islamaphobia, alarming escalations in ICE raids, and the role of gender in the vilification of immigrants (women are seen as "pregnant breeders" and "social welfare drains" and men as criminal or "drug dealer aliens") were discussed. Finally, Prof. Hondagneu-Sotelo concluded that only structural integration of immigrants (social, political, legal, and civic) would ultimately end this "shoots and ladders game" of U.S. policies toward immigrants.

Since we were sharing the liaison role, Carmel and I decided it was best that we split up on the workshops we would attend to provide a better summary. After lunch, I attended two workshops. First, "The Life of the Academic Paper: From Seminar to Publication" was very instructive. The panel included authors of recently published papers in Gender & Society with the journal editor, Dana Britton. They addressed nuts-and-bolts questions about the submittal



process and also substantive questions like what constitutes an interesting "hook" or theoretical claim and how to use data to tell a story for a distinctive paper.

Second, I attended "What to Say and When to Say It: Make the Mass Media Work for You." Presenters discussed good and bad experiences dealing with media interest in their work and how feminist sociologists can interface more effectively with wider audiences. SWS media specialist, Theta Pavis, engaged paired participants in a hands-on exercise to imagine "you're stuck in an elevator and have thirty seconds to explain your current research."

Finally, I have to say that the banquet was a lot of fun, especially Sarah Fenstermaker's MC-ing a very memorable silent auction!! For me, this was a valuable learning and networking opportunity - thank you, SWS-South!

Highlights from the Business Meeting:

Treasurer Report: Getting approval of budget form membership for 2010 (haven't been doing that in most recent years). Hope to get membership more involved and keep that up for the future. Proposed change to treasures: Make treasurer a 3 year sequence that matches that of president - 1) Deputy Treasurer, 2) Treasurer, 3) Past Treasurer.

Communications Report: 1) We have a new media specialist 2) SWS is getting a new logo/website 3) Newsletter model is changing, a lot of information is moving to the website, the default will now be to receive the newsletter online.

WOCDS (Women of Color Dissertation Scholarship) Naming Proposal: Approved. The WOCDS will now be called the Esther Ling Nang Chow and Mary Joyce Green Dissertation Scholarship.


Awards Policy Proposal: Approved (78 yes/ 55

no). Please see official policy - in sum, a procedure is now in place for creating new awards and naming awards. Discussion and dissention revolved around naming awards after living versus deceased persons, with the new policy awards will be named after deceased persons only.

MFP Funding Request: Approved. Margaret Anderson (representing ASA) requested \$100,000 pledge from SWS to permanently fund an MFP (Minority Fellowship Program) - this is in addition to SWS's annual support of MFP. Publications Committee: Recently signed a new contract with Sage (contract is really good). Beginning the search for a new Editor of Gender & Society, this is a 5 year position. Gender & Society - numbers from last year: 363 decisions; average reviewer time 26 days; acceptance rate 8% (this includes rejection at the door); if not rejected at the door, 25% chance of receiving a R&R; chances of acceptance after R&R resubmit 50%.

Membership Committee: 19 matches for Hand program and continued positive response from participants.

Awards

Dr. Shelia R. Cotton, associate professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Alabama - Birmingham, won a 2010 Dean’s Award for Excellence in Mentoring.

Dr. Irene Padavic, Professor and Pepper Chair at the Department of Sociology at Florida State University, was awarded the Katherine Jocher-Belle Boone Beard Award in 2010 for distinguished scholarly contributions to the understanding of gender and society. Dr. Padavic joined the faculty at Florida State University after receiving her Ph.D. from the University of Michigan and is currently chair of the department.

With the exception of a year as a fellow at the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University, she has spent her career at Florida State.

Dr. Padavic’s work in the area of gender began with participant observation as a coal-handler in a power plant in the late 1980s. “As the only woman in a 1920s-era plant, she shoveled a lot of coal and learned at least as much about gender and segregation as she did about electricity.” The results of that experience appeared in *Symbolic Interaction* in 1991, and in a couple of dozen articles and two books, she continued to publish research about how gender operates in settings as varied as workplaces, sororities and fraternities, police academies, the military, the legal system, and on farms.

Most of Irene’s projects have involved students, and she received mentoring awards from Florida State University (in 2007), from Sociologists for Women in Society (in 1999), and from FSU graduate students (2009). “Working with graduate students is the best part of this job,” she says. “Helping newcomers to the profession hone their creative ideas, harness the ideas to a bibliography, and write them up in an engaging and accessible way is very satisfying, and so are the relationships that continue over the years as they progress through their careers.”

Irene has been an active member of the SSS since her arrival in the South as a result of the prodding of Charles Tolbert, the former department chair. “Charles made it seem as though membership in the society went hand-in-hand with membership in the department. I didn’t realize there was a choice!” Now as department chair, she continues the tradition. “We had 22 FSU graduate students attend the 2009 meeting,” she said, “and I suspect many didn’t realize that not attending was an option!”

She has served on the SSS Executive Committee, the Elections Committee, the Committee on the Status of Women, and the Program Committee. Irene has participated in SWS-South events along the way, and, furthermore, she began and oversaw an SWS chapter at FSU for nearly 20 years. This organization has had a wonderful influence on FSU’s graduate students and on the entire department. (Most recently, we had Barrie Thorne as our guest speaker!)
